

Roger J. Brule

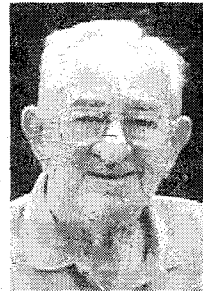
Littleton, Murray Printing retiree, WWII vet; 85

LITTLETON — Roger J. Brule, age 85, of Littleton, MA, died on April 15, in Concord, MA.



He was born in Forge Village, on February 24, 1924. He was the son of the late Edmund and Eva (Lamy) Brule. He attended Westford Public Schools.

Roger joined the U.S. Army during WWII, serving in the Pacific Theatre as a Chaplain's assistant and was awarded The Bronze Star.



Mr. Brule worked at The Abbott Worsted Company in his early years, then as a foreman for TIC (Technology Instrument Corporation) of Acton for several years until they relocated. He then became a bindery supervisor for The Murray Printing Company, (now Courier Corporation) in Forge Village, for 30 years, retiring in 1986.

He was married to Dorothy (Shea) Brule and would have celebrated 59 years of marriage in June. Together, they made their home in Littleton, and spent summers at their Cape Cod home in Harwichport, MA. He was a member of VFW Matawannakee Post #6539, and a member of Saint Anne's Parish in Littleton.

Roger was an avid golfer and bowler, and was an accomplished hockey and baseball player in his youth.
